

Vegetation Management / Wildfire Mitigation Workforce Development Proposal

Presented to Sonoma County Office of Recovery and Resiliency

February 2021

Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) stands ready to serve Sonoma County by training a workforce to mitigate the risk of future catastrophic wildfires.

SRJC currently offers four workforce development programs focused on "pre-defeating" wildfires and protecting homes through vegetation management and fire-resilient landscaping. <u>These programs are built and ready to scale up immediately to meet the urgency of this moment</u>:

- 1) Fire Abatement and Prevention Certificate
- 2) Natural Resources Certificate
- 3) Animal Science Certificate
- 4) Landscape Design or Landscape Construction and Maintenance Certificate

The knowledge and skills taught in these four programs address the full spectrum of strategies for wildfire mitigation through vegetation management: fire resilient landscaping and creating defensible space; livestock grazing; arboriculture; ladder fuel reduction; watershed hydrology; improving soil and plant health; preparing for prescribed burns; invasive species eradication; and ecological restoration.

A modest investment of the PG&E settlement funds currently allocated for vegetation management will enable SRJC to ramp up these four workforce programs to train up to 500 new students over the next five years. Funding will support additional instructional staff; a bilingual student outreach coordinator; equipment; supplies; and paid student internships in these hands-on, experiential training programs based at Shone Farm, our 365-acre learning laboratory in Forestville. In the current COVID-19 environment, lecture coursework can be delivered online and fieldwork can be conducted safely outdoors with masks and social distancing.

SRJC also offers Shone Farm—with its pastures, mixed hardwood forest, riparian areas, vineyards, row crops, orchards, and buildings—as an ideal demonstration site for community workshops on fire-safe land management practices, delivered in conjunction with the County and nonprofit partners.

SRJC brings a deep commitment to social equity to all our work. Grant funds will support a dedicated bilingual student outreach coordinator for this program. We will leverage our extensive partnerships with community-based organizations serving underrepresented residents of Sonoma County to recruit new students. We have also initiated conversations with the Sonoma County Probation Camp and Ya-Ka-Ama Indian Education Center about future partnerships on vegetation management training.

This is a critical moment for the future of Sonoma County. A steady pipeline of well-trained and qualified workers is <u>essential</u> to the success of Sonoma County's generational investment in fire prevention and mitigation. SRJC is ready to do our part by quickly training 300 new workers in wildfire mitigation through vegetation management. We are prepared to launch the first cohort of new students in summer or fall of 2021.

We welcome feedback and additional dialogue with the County on this proposal.

SRJC's proposal addresses all three criteria identified by Sonoma County Board of Supervisors for allocation of PG&E settlement funds: equity, leveraged dollars, and community partnerships


